entertaining way to understand the life and times of the Victorian Era. Some classics include Mrs. Brown, Jane Eyre, Bleak House, Little Lord Fauntleroy, Anna Karenina, A Little Princess, Amistad, Anna and the King, and Around the World in 80 Days.

**Fireworks** Victoria Day is traditionally celebrated with a fireworks display. If fireworks are legal in your area, put on a display for your residents and their guests.

**Gardening** May is the perfect time to plant a garden. Honor Queen Victoria by planting a traditional country <u>English Garden</u>. Cultivate plants, flowers, and herbs that can be used and enjoyed within your community.

**Drawing** Simple pen and ink drawing was a favorite pastime during Victorian times. Pass out pencils, pens, and paper to your residents and let the drawing begin.



**Scrap Album** Making scrap albums was a popular Victorian activity. Print small pictures from the internet or cut them from magazines to assemble in a scrap book. Residents can document important events in their past, favorite items, or happenings within the community.

**Parlour Games** In the days before television and computers, people living during the Victorian era entertained themselves with games. Try a few of these popular <u>parlour games</u> with your residents or invited guests.

Prepare a Piece Another common practice while entertaining guests during

Victorian times was to "prepare a piece." Ask your staff and residents to prepare a piece to be performed. It could be a poem or verse that is read, a song, or a musical piece played on an instrument.
